Participation: The participation mark will be based on your group discussions.

Research Project and Presentation: Your group will select a particular era or decade to conduct research on women during that time (the only era you cannot choose is World War 11). The purpose of this project is to examine the social, economic, political, cultural, and domestic relations that impacted on women in the era/decade you have chosen. For example, you may choose to look at the depression era. To begin, you might want to look at demographics - the number of women compared to men, the average number of children in a family, the age at which couples married, etc. Other areas that could be of interest is how the economic situation impacted on domestic labour/women's paid labour.

Were there policies in place during the 1930s to aid women? Did the political system make changes that had a direct impact on women during this era?

Each group member will determine what facet of the era/decade they would like to research and will be graded on their contribution. When you hand in your project, you will include a copy of all your research. If you have read books or watched films you will include reviews of the books or films. Journal articles, newspaper articles, magazine articles, internet sources, etc. are to have a very brief notation on them indicating their validity for inclusion in your presentation. All the research is to be directed at the area you have chosen to examine. You are to use a variety of sources: academic journals and texts, internet sources, the popular media, videos, diaries, etc. The research will be used to formulate your presentation. You are to keep a research log that details the process of your data collection. Your research project is to include a bibliography. You need to frame your presentation in one of the theories discussed in class. A copy of your presentation is to be included with your research project. Using footnotes, you will list the sources used in your presentation.

All assignments in the Department of Sociology are to use ASA style.

If you would like the class to watch a video or read an article pertaining to your presentation, email the details to me and I will send it to everyone in the class.

Since there will be no duplicate presentations you need to let the instructor know as soon as possible what era/decade your group has chosen.

<u>Presentation:</u> Your group will present the research project findings to the class. Each individual will be marked on their own merit.

Your research project and a copy of your presentation are due at the beginning of the class on July 30, 2013.
