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**Course Description**

This course of study addresses 3 basic questions: What is sociology? How do societies work? How is sociology personally relevant? Through readings, lectures, classroom discussions, and audio-visual materials, you will come to understand sociology's unique perspective on human behaviour, its main theoretical perspectives, and its basic research methodologies. The course identifies and examines various core sociological concepts including culture, socialization, social interaction, formal organizations, social stratification, crime and deviance, race and ethnicity, gender and sexuality, aging, social institutions (family, education, medicine, etc.), demography, collective behaviour, social movements, and globalization.

**Course Material**

Required Textbook: Macionis, John J., Linda M. Gerber. 2014. *Sociology: Eighth Canadian Edition*. Pearson Education Canada

It is imperative that you read the required chapters in the Macionis textbook according to the Course Schedule (see below). Please be advised that classroom lectures do not merely repeat the content found in our textbook. Attending lectures is not a substitute for reading the text. Examinations will include numerous questions on content from the Macionis textbook which is not covered in class. You may make comments and ask questions about textbook content in class. You are advised to prepare for your classes by reading your assigned chapters *before* the classes in which they are discussed.

MySocLab: The Macionis textbook is accompanied by an easy-to-use companion website (MySocLab) which serves as a helpful study guide. The website offers chapter summaries, learning objectives, self-help study questions, self-grading quizzes, 'explore & discuss' exercises, videos, guidance and sources for assignment preparations, and more. You are strongly encouraged to work with MySocLab on a regular basis. The link and access code to MySocLab are found in every new copy of the Macionis textbook. The specific Course Code needed to access the Soci-1100YA MySocLab site is mcmillan42765.

Lectures: Lectures are an important source of required course content. You should make every effort to attend classes regularly. You are responsible for everything that takes place in class (announcements, lectures, videos, class discussions). Just as attending lectures is not a substitute for reading your main textbook, reading your text is not a substitute for attending classes. The examinations will include numerous questions based on material covered exclusively in class.

Videos: We will view several brief videos throughout the course of study. Video content will be discussed in class and may be included in course examinations. Because some of these videos may not be available outside of our classes, it is imperative that you attend their classroom showings.

### **Examinations**

The Mid-year and Final exams will be 3 hours in duration, will be held in the Gym (Saunders Fieldhouse), and may feature multiple-choice questions, short-answer questions, and essay questions. Dates and times of the Mid-year and Final exams will be announced at a later time. See the Grading Scheme above for examination weights.
