RESEARCH PAPER ASSIGNMENT

You are required to prepare and submit one research paper worth 10% of your final course grade. You MUST select a topic from the list below. Your paper MUST be prepared according to the following requirements:

- Your paper must include 4-5 pages of discussion NOT including your title page, References page, tables, graphics, figures, appendices, etc.
- Do NOT include an abstract or a table of contents.
- Any tables, graphics, figures, etc. must appear in an appendix at the end of your paper.

- You must use ASA (American Sociological Association) formatting style for your title page, References page, pagination, margins, in-text citations, etc. Google 'ASA' for abbreviated ASA formatting guides or try http://www.calstatela.edu/library/bi/rsalina/asa.styleguide.html
- Your paper must be typed, double-spaced, with a 12 point standard font.
- You must base your paper on at least 3 scholarly, peer-reviewed books or articles from academic journals (do not use our course textbook as one of your 4 sources).
- You must NOT use newspapers, magazines, videos, Wikipedia, encyclopedia, dictionaries or other non-academic sources or non-academic websites.
- Avoid value judgement and personal opinions. Do not use words like 'should' or 'ought', and avoid using personal anecdotes or first person references such as 'I', 'me', 'my', etc.
- Avoid plagiarism! Plagiarism is a serious offense! It is your responsibility to know what
 constitutes plagiarism and to familiarize yourself thoroughly with Lakehead University's
 official policy on academic dishonesty. See the L.U. calendar at "IX Academic Dishonesty".

- You must submit a hard copy of your paper. No electronic copies will be accepted. Be sure to save a copy of your paper to your hard drive.
- The deadline for the submission of your paper is March 19th, 2014, class time and location. Late papers will NOT be accepted. No exceptions! I strongly urge you to start your paper now.

In addition to the above assignment requirements, please consider the following when preparing your paper:

- Please note that the emphasis in the grading process will be placed on the format/structure of your paper... perhaps as much as 75% of your assignment grade will based on how well you lay-out your paper according to the ASA formatting criteria.
- The best papers are those which reflect a tight focus. A paper which is tightly focused, especially a short one such as this, has a better chance of generating the depth of analysis expected in university papers. Once you have selected your topic, explore ways of limiting your topic's scope.
- Provide a brief introduction (one paragraph only) in which you simply state the objectives of your paper. You might start your paper with something like "The following paper is an attempt to..." Don't include any references to the published literature in your introduction. Don't start your analysis of your topic in the introduction. Simply inform your reader what your paper is about (general topic, specific focus, theoretical perspective).
- In the body of your paper, you must address all the objectives stated in your introduction. This section represents the bulk of your paper and must include numerous references to scholarly, published literature on the topic. Remember: ideas that you draw from the work of others must be cited using ASA format; (e.g., Smith 2006:72).

- Provide a brief conclusion (one paragraph only) in which you simply summarize your paper's main points. You might start your conclusion with "In summary,..." Do not add anything new. Do not make any references to the published literature in your conclusion.
- Be absolutely sure that you discuss your topic in a SOCIOLOGICAL manner. I am not qualified to grade psychology, history, philosophy, political science, economics, or nursing papers, or any other paper that is not essentially sociological. If your paper is not sociological, I will be forced to return it to you ungraded.
